### THE FIRST READING

### NUMBERS 21:4-9

From Mount Hor the Israelites set out by the way to the Red Sea, to go around the land of Edom; but the people became impatient on the way. The people spoke against God and against Moses, "Why have you brought us up out of Egypt to die in the wilderness? For there is no food and no water, and we detest this miserable food." Then the LORD sent poisonous serpents among the people, and they bit the people, so that many Israelites died. The people came to Moses and said, "We have sinned by speaking against the LORD and against you; pray to the LORD to take away the serpents from us." So Moses prayed for the people. And the LORD said to Moses, "Make a poisonous serpent, and set it on a pole; and everyone who is bitten shall look at it and live." All of us once lived among them in the passions of our flesh, following the desires of flesh and senses, and we were by nature children of wrath, like everyone else. But God, who is rich in mercy, out of the great love with which he loved us even when we were dead through our trespasses, made us alive together with Christ— by grace you have been saved— and raised us up with him and seated us with him in the heavenly places in Christ Jesus, so that in the ages to come he might show the immeasurable riches of his grace in kindness toward us in Christ Jesus. For by grace you have been saved through faith, and this is not your own doing; it is the gift of God— not the result of works, so that no one may boast. For we are what he has made us, created in Christ Jesus for good works, which God prepared beforehand to be our way of life.

And we most humbly beseech you, O merciful Father, to hear us, and, with your Word and Holy Spirit, to bless and sanctify these gifts of bread and wine, that they may be for us the Body and Blood of your dearly-beloved Son Jesus Christ.

And we earnestly desire your goodness to accept this our sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving, whereby we offer and present to you, O Lord, our selves, our souls and bodies. Grant, we pray, that all who partake of this Holy Communion may worthily receive the most precious Body and Blood of your Son Jesus Christ, and be filled with your grace and heavenly benediction; and also that we and all your whole Church may be made one body with him, that he may dwell in us, and we in him; through the same Jesus Christ our Lord;

By whom, and with whom, and in whom, in the unity of the Holy Spirit all honor and glory be to you, O Father Almighty, world without end. *AMEN.*

## **INTERNATIONALLY RENOWNED ORGANIST, DAVID BRIGGS, BRINGS HITCHCOCK'S "THE LODGER" TO REDEEMER, JUNE 24**

On Sunday, June 24 at 8.00pm, Concert Organist, David Briggs, will be presenting a performance of Alfred Hitchcock's first great (and silent) movie, "The Lodger" with organ accompaniment. David Briggs, Artist-in-Residence at the Cathedral of St. John the Divine in NYC is one of the most successful of all concert organist working today. He is particularly famous for his performances all around the world of his own organ transcriptions of the symphonies of Gustav Mahler, and of improvised organ music to silent movies. The movies themselves, plus the improvised music, create an experience that is extremely moving. 'The Lodger', released in 1927 and starring Ivor Novello, is the movie in which Hitchcock is generally accepted to have found his 'voice'. This event will definitely be a time to invite your friends and family to come to Redeemer, as we expect an enthusiastic audience. It is the last in a year-long series of events that highlight the 10th anniversary of our DiGennaro-Hart pipe organ. Very special thanks for the Friends of Music at Redeemer, whose generosity makes this event possible.

### **Holy Land Film Series at St. John's - Join Us!**

St John's Norwood Holy Land Committee, in conjunction with Voices From the Holy Land (VFHL), is bringing a documentary film series to the neighborhood over the next two months. It began on March 4, St John's hosted a screening and moderated discussion of the first of four films, one each Sunday afternoon at 2:30 pm. The VFHL film series, whose hosts also include Ravensworth Baptist, Universalist Unitarian of Arlington, Westminster Presbyterian, and the DC Chapter of Jewish Voices for Peace, is free and open to the public at each venue. Our friends from Redeemer are cordially invited!

**On March 11 (today)**, we'll screen two short documentaries:

Bethlehem: Hidden From View and Gaza: A Gaping Wound. The first short tells the story of Israel's encircling wall around the 'Little Town' of Bethlehem, and its impact on the local Christian and Muslim community. The second short tells the story of ten families who lost loved ones during the 2014 Israeli military offensive against Gaza, through a series of interviews. Our co-moderators are Liana Smith, a local JVP activist and Zeina Azzam, the editor at the Arab Center.

**On April 8**, our documentary is the hard-hitting Roadmap to Apartheid, narrated by Alice Walker, author of The Color Purple. This documentary, produced by a white South African and a Jewish Israeli, takes a detailed look at the apartheid analogy often, and at times controversially, used to describe the Israeli-Palestinian political relationship. The analogy is a useful framework for understanding the conditions in which many Palestinians feel they live today. Our co-moderators are a local couple, Shelley Fudge of JVP and Jamal Najjab, a Palestinian-American activist.
