FROM THE HEARTH

Dear Friends in Christ,

Episcopalians have a reputation. With good humor and some self-effacement, we refer to ourselves as 'whisky-palians'. You may have heard the old chestnut: "Wherever you find four Episcopalians, you'll always find a fifth!"

However, it was no joking matter when, two days after Christmas last year, the former Suffragan Bishop of Maryland struck and killed a bicyclist while driving very drunk and simultaneously texting. This tragedy put the spotlight on the Episcopal Church and the culture of alcohol use we have so long tolerated if not encouraged.

When meeting in Salt Lake City in June, the General Convention of The Episcopal Church responded by passing two resolutions relating to alcohol use in the Church. By these resolutions, the General Convention urged dioceses and congregations to review their alcohol use policies, keeping in mind that any behavior that undermines wholeness, healing, renewal, and justice should be amended

or discontinued. You can read resolutions A158 and A159 at http://www.generalconvention.org/gc/2015-resolutions. (See also report on p. 12.)

I shared the resolutions with the Vestry at our July meeting. I also expressed my concerns about the alcohol culture I have witnessed in the parishes I have served, including Redeemer. The lack of designated monitors of alcohol consumption at receptions, especially when there are children present, is dangerous. While alternative libations are always offered at Redeemer receptions, diocesan policy obligates us to offer even more appealing alternatives. Going forward we must also have someone whose job it is to monitor and control the distribution and use of any alcoholic beverages that are offered at events in our building. There are legal ramifications for The Church of the Redeemer flowing from alcohol use at receptions that we need to keep in mind. We also want to protect our young children from ingesting alcohol at church events. The Vestry therefore encourages all persons who plan events to designate a monitor of alcohol consumption, and to report anyone who might be impaired to the Rector and/or the Wardens so that arrangements can be made to get them safely home.

The Vestry also decided we would begin this fall using *nonalcoholic* wine for Eucharistic celebrations, and discontinue the use of grape juice. The Church of the Redeemer hosts five Twelve Step groups. These groups stand as a witness to the

Worship

WORSHIP AT REDEEMER

As we enter the Fall, Redeemer's regular weekly schedule of worship will be:

Taizé Service & Healing Rite

First Mondays (October – June), 7:30 p.m.

Taizé is an informal, contemplative liturgy with scripture, icons, incense, silence, and chant accompanied by piano, guitar, and other instruments. The Healing Rite — prayers for healing of body, mind, or spirit for yourself or someone you love — is offered at the conclusion of the service. Taizé is held on the first Monday of each month, October — June, and every Monday in Lent.

The Taizéé Service will resume on Monday, October 5, at 7:30 p.m. We extend a special invitation to those who have never experienced the quiet beauty of Taizé. If you have questions, please contact parishioner Clark Downs: 301-654-4721 or ced122@comcast.net; or the Parish Office.

Wednesday Worship

All are welcome to join us for worship on Wednesdays. The service of Morning Prayer, taken from *The Book of Common Prayer*, is held in the side chapel at 9:00 a.m. The liturgy lasts for about 30 minutes and includes time for intercessory prayer.

Holy Eucharist is celebrated at 12:00 noon. The liturgy includes materials from *The Book of Common Prayer* and *Enriching our Worship*. The homily typically includes dialogue about the lectionary readings for the coming Sunday. Worshippers gather round the altar for the Liturgy of the Eucharist. We hope you will join us when you are able!

LITURGICAL ASSISTANTS TRAINING

Sunday, September 27, and Sunday, October 4, 12:30 p.m. The Rev'd Cricket Park, Rector, the Rev'd Robin Razzino, Associate Rector, and lay ministry leaders will conduct two trainings for Liturgical Assistants: Sunday, September 27, for Acolytes, Crucifers, Chalicists, Greeters, Torch Bearers, and Ushers; and Sunday, October 4, for Lectors and Intercessors. If you already serve in one of these ministries, please attend the appropriate session if you wish to continue to serve.

Participation in Worship

The word "liturgy" is derived from two Greek words meaning "work of the people." By their presence alone, all who gather for worship — young, old, and every age in between — are participants in the liturgy of the Church. The opportunities for lay members to participate in a distinct role during worship are:

Acolyte: In contemporary usage, a general term that covers not only those who assist at the altar during the Liturgy of the Eucharist, but also torch bearers, crucifers, and thurifers.

Altar Guild: A volunteer group whose ministry is to care for the altar, vestments, vessels, and altar linens of the parish. Altar Guild members prepare the sanctuary for liturgical celebrations and clean-up afterwards. They also oversee decoration of the sanctuary and nave with flowers.

Chorister: A member of one of the parish choirs. Choristers rehearse weekly to prepare beautiful, finely-crafted music for the glory of God and the edification of the worshipping community.

Crucifer: The acolyte whose role is to carry the cross in procession. The crucifer sometimes assists in other ways during the liturgy.

Eucharistic Minister: A lay person licensed by the bishop to administer the consecrated elements of the Eucharist.

Greeter: An individual who welcomes visitors and newcomers as they leave at the conclusion of the liturgy.

Lay Eucharistic Visitor: A lay person licensed by the bishop to share the Blessed Sacrament with members of the congregation who, through illness or infirmity, are unable to be present for the celebration of the Holy Eucharist.

Lector: A trained lay person who reads one or more of the lessons during the Liturgy of the Word.

Usher: A lay person who greets and assists people as they enter the church. Ushers may hand out service leaflets, answer questions of visitors and newcomers, count the number of people in the congregation, collect and present the offering at the offertory, assist parishioners during the administration of Holy Communion, and clean the pews and church building after the service.

HEALING MINISTRY

The Healing Ministry at Redeemer had its beginnings in the late 1990s shortly after completion of the new church building. Under the guidance of the Rev'd Susan Thon, former Rector, and Melanie Sunderland, then seminarian and Virginia Theological Seminary student, a small group of lay members of the parish began meeting twice a month. The group established a routine of study, discussion and prayer, incorporating a variety of materials to increase awareness of the healing ministry, and for our own personal preparedness to enter into this sacred space. We studied assorted writings on healing precepts, inspirational readings, excerpts from *The Book of Common Prayer* and *The New Zealand Prayer Book*, and biblical passages of Jesus' healing ministry. We folded these into our consciousness through the use of lectio divina, meditation, and prayer.

Through God's grace, we introduced the practice of the Healing Rite with the Laying on of Hands at each of the Sunday services, once a month. Prayers offered were clergy and lay-led, depending on scheduling needs. Healing Ministry members assisted at all services. Later on the Healing Rite was added at the Taizé service to provide an additional opportunity for support to those in need of healing for themselves and others.

Now, as we enter a time of new growth and transition at Redeemer, we invite you to consider participating in what we know to be a transformative ministry. Please prayerfully consider your own spiritual path to discern if making a commitment to this ministry is part of your faith journey. Members of the Healing Ministry, along with the Rev'd Cricket Park, Rector, hope to offer the Healing Rite twice a month at the Sunday Eucharist, 8:00 a.m. and 10:30 a.m., as well as at the monthly Taizé service on Monday evenings.

Those in the ministry will be happy to share who we are and what we do, and the training and commitment involved. We are small in number, but mighty in sharing God's healing for you, for those you love, and for those who are in need of healing in body, mind or spirit. CONTEMPLATIVE OPPORTUNITIES AT REDEEMER

In addition to the contemplative service of Taizé on the first Monday of each month, Redeemer offers three other contemplative opportunities on the second, third and fourth Mondays of the month. These offerings are described below. The Lectio Divina is a new addition on the fourth Monday starting in October. These offerings are intended to help participants deepen their understanding of their own spiritual

journey. While each of the Monday offerings is somewhat different, the focus is on contemplation through a choice of silence, music, chant, prayer, reading and discussion. Regular attendance is not required — please join any Monday evening whenever you wish to do so. Sessions are held in the Nave.

Christian Contemplative Group

Second Mondays (September – June), 7:30 p.m.

The Christian Contemplative Group is a small, intimate group that is exploring contemplative practices. Each session includes a short liturgy of simple chants, readings, centering prayer, and discussion about a selected text. At present, the group is studying the gospel of Thomas. Questions? Benedictine Group

Third Mondays, (September – June), 7:30 p.m.

For Saint Benedict, the spiritual life lay in simply living our daily life well — turning the ordinary into an experience of the extraordinary; a union with the sacred in the here and now. Lectio Divina

Fourth Mondays (October – June), 7:30 p.m. Lectio Divina, reflective sacred reading, has deep roots in Benedictine spirituality. FROM TOM SMITH, OUTGOING DIRECTOR OF MUSIC

Dear parishioners and friends:

In January 2004, when our former Rector, the Rev'd Susan Thon, called me to serve as The Church of the Redeemer's Director of Music, I accepted the (very!) part-time position thinking that I would be among you until the completion of my graduate studies at The Peabody Conservatory roughly 16 months later, at which point, I, in my youthful arrogance, assumed I would move on to "bigger and better things". And now here I am, writing this letter of thanks and farewell, having served this parish for nearly 12 years. God *does* work in mysterious ways!

Together we have built a music ministry of exceptional breadth and quality, particularly for a parish of Redeemer's size. Almost 60 individuals of varying ages and levels of ability sing in the Adult and Youth Choirs. The Music at Redeemer Series continues to attract sizable and, in many cases, capacity crowds for concerts and special choral liturgies. The Taizé Service provides an opportunity for worship to an entirely different "congregation", many of whom may not otherwise enter the door of a church if it were not for this simple, contemplative liturgy. Summer Music Camp serves as a unique form of musical outreach to members of the wider community and, in particular, children and youth who might not otherwise experience the joy of music-making. Installed in 2007 and expanded in 2013, Redeemer's beautiful and versatile Di Gennaro-Hart organ, lovingly and creatively designed and built by parishioner Michael Hart, continues to serve the parish in both liturgical and concert settings. Deo gratias!

I said this to members of the choirs last week and I say it again here: Serving at The Church of the Redeemer has been one of the great joys, privileges, and blessings of my life. I take with me so many wonderful memories: services of Choral Evensong and Lessons & Carols, concerts, commissions, premieres, camps, choir trips, hymn-a-thons, foyer dinners, Strawberry Festivals, the installation of the organ. The list goes on and on! Words cannot adequately express how grateful I am for the love and support so many people – clergy, staff, adult and youth choristers, choir parents, other parishioners — have shown me over the years. This parish and its people will always hold a very special place in my heart. I hope and pray that each of you will continue to support and work to strengthen Redeemer's ministry of music, which has become such an important part of the parish's identity. And I give thanks for the arrival of Christopher Betts, Redeemer's new Director of Music, who, I know, will serve the parish well as we all move forward in faith. Although I will miss seeing you on a routine basis, I am comforted by the fact that I will be just down the road at Christ Church, Georgetown.

I conclude with words from one of my favorite hymns:

Too soon we rise; we go our several ways; the feast, though not the love, is past and gone, the Bread and Wine consumed: yet all our days thou still art here with us — our Shield and Sun.

ON-LINE DONATION SYSTEM NOW AVAILABLE

Redeemer now has an online payments service on the parish website for pledges and donations. Our thanks to parishioners Lois Burleigh and Janice Huey for the research they did to help with the selection of Vanco as the service provider. Administrative Assistant Angela Beckman has created user-friendly pledge and donation pages on Redeemer's website.

Pledge payments: Payments can be made on a pledge (one-time/monthly/weekly) using a checking/savings account or with a credit/debit card. Participants can create a profile, set up recurring payments and make one-time donations. Donors may also choose to cover the service fee if they wish to do so. A receipt for each and every payment will go to the donor and to the Parish Office. For donations of stock, please contact the Parish Office.

When it comes time to make a 2016 pledge, parishioners will be able to go to the website to complete an electronic pledge card, send it to the office, and then continue on to set up payment. Printed pledge cards will also be available in the Parish Hall and mailed to all parish households.


BETHESDA CARES DINNER PROGRAM

PRAYING WITH HANDS AND HEART: WORKSHOP REFLECTION

Redeemer has a long-standing relationship with Misa Alegria, the Spanish-speaking congregation at St. Stephen and the Incarnation in the District of Columbia, through the Rev'd Sarabeth Goodwin, a former Redeemer seminarian who is now also Latin Missioner for the Diocese of Washington. Inspired by our joint reading of Enrique's Journey, members of Redeemer and Misa Alegria met four times in January and February of this year to share a meal and hear personal stories inspired by the prize-winning book. Following the series, Sarabeth invited members of Redeemer to a two-day workshop in April, Praying with Hands and Heart.

On the first evening, workshop leader Enedina Vasquez, a poet, playwright and visual artist from Texas, long associated with St. Stephen's, began by asking us to choose a design from a selection of angels, saints and Christian symbols to make a "contemporary icon," or an "Intercessor of Today." She instructed us to color in the image we chose with watercolor, then let the paper dry so that a mix of paraffin and beeswax could be applied, and press the image flat with an iron. Next, do the unthinkable: Crumple up the "work of art" and cover the image (mine was an angel) with black paint and remove the wax. At this point, expecting a wreck, I saw the angel transformed: the process of coloring, waxing, ironing, painting and distress had given the paper and the angel image a "batik effect," turning it into a stunning image.

Surprise was at the heart of turning an outline of an angel into an icon, an "Intercessor of Today." I did not know what I was doing and did not guess what was to come from the process. I have taken many workshops, but Enedina's challenge, apparently straightforward - coloring something that could have come from a coloring book - undid me, in the best sense.

Saturday morning we met again at St. Stephen's for Part 2 of the workshop. We arranged our tables so we could see each other when we took turns reading the stories we were about to write. Enedina read hers, written from the point of view of herself as a child, and she invited us to do the same with a story of our own. She explained the art of the *platica* (discourse, conversation), within which one might rediscover "one's inner voice." As Enedina was speaking, I picked up on a pervasive hum in the room, the sound of a voice quietly translating from English to Spanish.

For me the simultaneous translation could be understood as the outward and audible sign of an inward and spiritual need: communicating with one another. This acute need had prompted the stories told when we had met in January and February: shared personal accounts of escape from unbearable hardship. Related by members of *Misa alegria* and repeated simultaneously in Spanish or English, they offered

us all the comfort of listening and hearing the stories in our own language. This, and potentially much more, *Misa alegria* offers its congregation.

Enedina gave us half an hour to write down our own stories, the platica — our grown-up selves in conversation with our childhood selves. Not all of us shared, but those that did heard their stories in Spanish and English, no one was left out. Abruptly, it was time to move into the church to the lovely nicho, the People's Altar that celebrates the Latinidad of Misa alegria. Before we were to break for lunch, Sarabeth wanted us to hear the story of the altar, how it came to be and to learn about Enedina's involvement: Misa alegria had been in need of its very own altar and the church had received a gift from the estate of former Redeemer parishioner Deborah Howell, a collection of icons and santos that included work by Enedina and her late husband Arturo. When Sarabeth and Enedina made the discovery, Enedina knew she was called to help the church create their nicho — a beautiful blue altar/wall adorned with pieces from Deborah's collection – another link between Redeemer and St. Stephen and the Incarnation.

Sarabeth invited us to conclude the workshop with a "whole body blessing," a first for most of us. We paired off with the person each of us found at hand and, facing one another, we blessed our partner's ears and hearing, eyes and seeing, our entire bodies, and finally we blessed our partner's forehead with the sign of the cross, with holy oil.

COMMUNICATIONS SURVEY REPORT

Thank you to the 76 households that responded to the Communications Survey, representing 46% of all parish

households. The survey was conducted in August. Ninety-one percent of responses were from people aged 46 and above; 50% of respondents have been at Redeemer for over 10 years, and 41% for between three and ten years. Smart phones are used by 84% of respondents.

Overall, respondents consider that Redeemer does a good job of communicating with parishioners through a variety of means in ways that are appropriate. The majority believe they are very well/well informed about the church and its activities, and that information is most effectively provided through This Week at Redeemer, Sunday Announcements, special event emails, verbal announcements, and *The Redeemer Spirit* newsletter.

Respondents prefer one comprehensive email a week, along with specific emails for special events. Announcements are mostly read during the worship service, when verbal announcements are also valued. The parish website is seen as a good source for information on a variety of topics with the potential of being more interactive. Social media is a chosen resource for information by only a few parishioners.

For the future, improvements would include:

- An online parish directory and listings of committees
- An interactive blog on the website dealing with faith, spirituality, and social justice topics
- Parishioner stories and information included in the newsletter on a regular basis
- Increased understanding of and information about parish finances
- Additional information on mission/outreach and volunteer opportunities.

The information provided by this survey will be of value as the clergy and staff work to provide the best communication and information resources possible to the parish. Our thanks to the Rev'd Robin Razzino for creating the survey and getting it launched.

VESTRY NEWS



78TH GENERAL CONVENTION REPORT

The 78th General Convention of The Episcopal Church gathered in Salt Lake City from June 23 through July 3, 2015. The Convention elected Michael Curry, Diocesan Bishop of North Carolina, as the 27th Presiding

Bishop of the Church; and enacted significant changes in the organizational structure and governance of the church and future general conventions. The Convention was treated to amazing daily worship services and an old fashioned gun control protest march. By adjournment, the Convention had acted on 392 resolutions. The texts of the resolutions the Convention considered and the manner in which each was disposed can be found at http://www.generalconvention.org/gc/2015-resolutions/.

Two of the most significant resolutions were brought to General Convention from the Diocese of Washington. The first (C018) calls for encouraging pilgrimage to the Holy Land; education concerning the plight of Christians and Palestinians in Israel; and continued support for the Episcopal Diocese of Jerusalem. A related resolution (B013) directs the church to collect resources for inter-faith conversation regarding conflict in the Holy Land; to encourage Bishop Curry to travel early to the Holy Land; to increase financial support of Palestinian enterprise; and to urge the United States government to take stronger and more proactive steps, particularly in the UN Security Council, to develop a comprehensive framework for a two-state solution.

Another resolution (D016) proposed that the church compile lists of those corporations that support the infrastructure of illegal settlements in formerly Palestinian territories, and of goods and services produced in such illegally occupied territories and the corporations who produce them. D016 was defeated in the House of Bishops and an attempt to revive the measure failed in the House of Deputies.

The other resolution brought forward from EDOW (C019) decries the numerous deaths of unarmed black men and youth at the hands of law enforcement personnel, and the moral atrocity of mass incarceration in which a hugely disproportionate number of persons of color have been unfairly caught in the criminal justice system. By passing C019, the Convention affirmed as a top priority of The Episcopal Church the challenging and difficult work of racial reconciliation through prayer, teaching, engagement, and action.

The Convention approved two liturgies for trial use that will permit same-sex couples to be married in The Episcopal Church, beginning on the first Sunday of Advent this year. This action came just days after the U.S. Supreme Court ruled that same-sex couples can now be married in all 50 states. The two liturgies, which were in Resolution A054, include a gender-neutral version of the current marriage service in *The Book of Common Prayer*, as well as a version of a liturgy that was approved in 2012 for blessing same-sex unions that now also provides vows of marriage. These rites do not refer to "man and woman" or "husband and wife," but instead use "these persons" or "the couple" to refer to the two people being married.

By resolutions A158 and A159, the General Convention urged dioceses and congregations to review their alcohol use policies. Resolution A158 observes that Church culture too often avoids hard conversations about alcohol use. The Convention directed the Church to aspire to be a place where conversations about alcohol, substance misuse, and addictions are not just about treatment but also about wholeness and healing. Resolution A159 commits the Church to speak to promote spiritual practices as a means of prevention and healing, and to advocate for public funding and health insurance coverage for prevention, intervention, treatment and recovery.

The environment was also the subject of intense debate. Resolution C045 calls on the church to divest from fossil fuel companies and reinvest in clean renewable energy.

These are but a few of the subjects that engaged Bishops and Deputies in long days of debate and prayer over hundreds of proposed Episcopal Church actions and policies. The subjects of these discussions included gender and income equality; racial reconciliation; pension board policies and benefit schedules; LGBT issues, disability rights; and the moral hazards of war and injustice in the Sudan, the Dominican Republic and Pakistan.

We were reminded of the call to love by homeless people huddled on the street corners of Salt Lake City. We melted in the heat of the city and shivered in the excessively airconditioned corridors and meeting halls of the Salt Palace. It was an honor, a pleasure and a labor of faith and love.

Mission/Outreach Report

The Vestry accepted the report and recommendations of the Mission/Outreach Committee for distribution of some portion of the mission/outreach budgeted funds. The Vestry hopes that the committee will be able to share more about the supported ministries in the future. (See p.. 8)

Stewardship

A Stewardship Committee and a Fall Pledge Campaign Committee are being formed by the Rector, along with Vestry members Cathy Arrington and Michael Mershon. This is in response to Spencer Pugh's Stewardship Ministry workshop held at Redeemer in early July.

Junior Warden Report

Clark Downs reported on several resolutions that were passed by the 78th General Convention of The Episcopal Church held this summer in Salt Lake City. (See p. 12) As a result of resolutions A158 and A159, the Vestry engaged in serious discussion about Redeemer's policy regarding alcohol use. A motion was made and unanimously approved to use only nonalcoholic wines at Communion and suspend the use of grape juice. (See p. 1)

The Vestry will not meet in August. The next Vestry meeting is scheduled for September 17, 2015.

welcoming culture of Redeemer. The meetings downstairs have often inspired people to move upstairs to join us on Sunday mornings.

Using nonalcoholic wine for Holy Communion is similarly hospitable. As things stand, those who desire a nonalcoholic alternative are asked to go to a 'separate but equal' side of the altar to receive grape juice. This can threaten a recovering person's anonymity and the presence of alcoholic wine can threaten the recovery itself. We need to be one people receiving from one cup.

This new policy does not take anything from the Eucharist. Remember, you receive the benefits of Christ's presence whether you receive the sacrament of communion in both kinds, in one kind, or not at all. Your participation in the liturgy, hearing the Word, praying with the congregation, confession, and being at peace, are all blessings we receive as the body of Christ. The new practice will keep our celebration of the Eucharist open and unsegregated.
