WE WELCOME YOU TO CHURCH OF THE REDEEMER.

We are an Episcopal Church. Our prayers and liturgies have their roots in the first prayer book in the English language (1549), and blossom as the spirit leads us. Everything you need for our liturgy is in this bulletin. If you would like to reference *The Book of Common Prayer* (1979), you will find one near you.

In the early church, everyone stood to pray. You are invited to stand, kneel or sit for the prayers, as you are able. It is our practice to stand while singing—apart from the hymn during the distribution of communion, in which case we sit. We sit for readings and songs from scripture, but we stand for the Gospel reading, turning to face the Gospel Book to elevate Christ's word and example. We also stand for the Creed.

ALL SAINTS' DAY

All Saints' Day commemorates all saints, known and unknown, on Nov. 1 and may also be celebrated on the Sunday following Nov. 1. All Saints' Day is one of the seven principal feasts of the church year, and one of the four days recommended for the administration of baptism.

FIRST READING—Daniel 7:1-3, 15-18

Lector A Reading from the book of Daniel.

¹In the first year of King Belshazzar of Babylon, Daniel had a dream and visions of his head as he lay in bed. Then he wrote down the dream: ²I, Daniel, saw in my vision by night the four winds of heaven stirring up the great sea, ³and four great beasts came up out of the sea, different from one another.

¹⁵As for me, Daniel, my spirit was troubled within me, and the visions of my head terrified me. ¹⁶I approached one of the attendants to ask him the truth concerning all this. So he said that he would disclose to me the interpretation of the matter: ¹⁷“As for these four great beasts, four kings shall arise out of the earth. ¹⁸But the holy ones of the Most High shall receive the kingdom and possess the kingdom forever—forever and ever.”

¹¹In Christ we have also obtained an inheritance, having been destined according to the purpose of him who accomplishes all things according to his counsel and will, ¹²so that we, who were the first to set our hope on Christ, might live for the praise of his glory. ¹³In him you also, when you had heard the word of truth, the gospel of your salvation, and had believed in him, were marked with the seal of the promised Holy Spirit; ¹⁴this is the pledge of our inheritance toward redemption as God's own people, to the praise of his glory.

¹⁵I have heard of your faith in the Lord Jesus and your love toward all the saints, and for this reason ¹⁶I do not cease to give thanks for you as I remember you in my prayers. ¹⁷I pray that the God of our Lord Jesus Christ, the Father of glory, may give you a spirit of wisdom and revelation as you come to know him, ¹⁸so that, with the eyes of your heart enlightened, you may know what is the hope to which he has called you, what are the riches of his glorious inheritance among the saints, ¹⁹and what is the immeasurable greatness of his power for us who believe, according to the working of his great power. ²⁰God put this power to work in Christ when he raised him from the dead and seated him at his right hand in the heavenly places, ²¹far above all rule and authority and power and dominion, and above every name that is named, not only in this age but also in the age to come. ²²And he has put all things under his feet and has made him the head over all things for the church, ²³which is his body, the fullness of him who fills all in all.

WORDS OF INSTITUTION

We give thanks to you, O God, for the goodness and love which you have made known to us in creation; in the calling of Israel to be your people; in your Word spoken through the prophets; and above all in the Word made flesh, Jesus, your Son. For in these last days you sent him to be incarnate from the Virgin Mary, to be the Savior and Redeemer of the world. In him, you have delivered us from evil, and made us worthy to stand before you. In him, you have brought us out of error into truth, out of sin into righteousness, out of death into life.

On the night before he died for us, our Lord Jesus Christ took bread; and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

After supper he took the cup of wine; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said, "Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me."

Unite us to your Son in his sacrifice, that we may be acceptable through him, being sanctified by the Holy Spirit. In the fullness of time, put all things in subjection under your Christ, and bring us to that heavenly country where, with all your saints, we may enter the everlasting heritage of your sons and daughters; through Jesus Christ our Lord, the firstborn of all creation, the head of the Church, and the author of our salvation.

By him, and with him, and in him, in the unity of the Holy Spirit all honor and glory is yours, Almighty Father, now and for ever. *AMEN.*

Gluten-free wafers and grape juice are available; please let the minister know your needs.

Bryan Stevenson was a gifted young attorney when he founded the Equal Justice Initiative, a legal practice dedicated to defending the poor, the wrongly condemned, and those trapped in the furthest reaches of our criminal system. One of his first cases was that of a young man sentenced to die for a notorious murder he did not commit. The case drew Stevenson into a tangle of conspiracy, political machination and legal brinkmanship. Advent Quiet Day 2019 at Redeemer

God within the Body: Paradox & Incarnation

December 7, 2019, 9:00 a.m. - 12:30 p.m., St. Luke's Chapel space

This gathering will be a quiet morning of silence and reflection centered on Benedictine spirituality as explored by spiritual teacher Esther de Waal in *Living with Contradiction* (Morehouse, Harrisburg PA 1987; reissued with new preface 1997/1998).

In her new preface to this meditation on the Psalms and the spirit of St. Benedict and his Rule, Esther de Waal shares one of her insights:

It is curiously liberating to realize that I shall go on until the day of my death trying to hold differing things together and that the task (for which I need all the help that I can get) must be to do it creatively, so that the tensions may become life-giving.

She goes on to explore connections that may be described as connections between healing and discernment, self-acceptance and the ability to go on and to go out into the world to help it heal, too. She provides questions for reflection that we will use after each chapter.

The morning will begin in a quiet circle and each hour will explore a different perspective on our quest for solace and strength:

- Healing: living with ourselves and others in acceptance rather than agreement;
- Discernment: listening to ourselves and others, no longer strangers to either but both stable and open to change;
- Self and the World: growing into who and where God is- where is that sacred center within us in all our complexity.

Participants may bring a bag lunch to eat together at noon in the parish hall (yoga will be over by then) and a simple soup will be served. Please sign up by Sunday, November 17, 2019.
